This track has been travelled by bullock drays from gerangamete to near Mount sabine and could be made available for vehicles down to AB by taking sidelings to escape the numerous steep hills now passed over. ... next report on 18/9/1873 says... A narrow and not very practicable track has been cleared through the forest to Apollo bay, by way of Mount sabine, and cattle are occasionally driven through by this route.

Home Mission Station abolished in 1951??? and Parsonage afterwards sold for 700 Pounds. Union Sunday School formed 1917. Main teacher was Alf Blundy 1917 to 1965. By the 1970s the building was in poor repair, services intermittent due to management of circuit and eventually
